ew Covenant seventh grader, **Jenna Ng**, won The News & Advance's Regional Spelling Bee on Saturday — for the third year in a row. Jenna was declared the winner after just 11 rounds of competition when she correctly spelled "contradictory," and qualified to compete in the ninety-third Scripps National Spelling Bee in Washington D.C. May 24-29.

In addition to an all expenses paid, sixnight, seven-day trip to D.C. for the competition, which *The News & Advance* has done for more than thirty years, Jenna received a one-year by John Heaton, Headmaster

NEW COVENANT'S TESSA HACKENBRACHT NAMED A TOP 3 SCORER IN THE AMC

n February 5, fourteen School of Rhetoric students traveled to Liberty University to compete with area schools in the American Mathematics Contest (AMC). The AMC 10 and AMC 12 tests, proctored nationwide, are the first in a series of competitions by the Mathematical Association of America (MAA) which form the U.S. Math Olympiad team. According to the MAA, "The AMC 10 and AMC 12 are the nation's leading mathematics competition for high schoolers and are designed to cultivate the mathematical capabilities of the next generation of problem solvers."

Sophomores Dalton Foster, Michael Marotta, and Ellie Walker completed the AMC 10 test while the following Juniors and Seniors took the AMC 12 test: Emily Brophy, Olivia Kalafian, Michael Minnick, Thomas Van Voorhis, Will Van Voorhis, Titus Brenning, Hannah Craven, Tessa Hackenbracht, Brandon Hostetler, Konner Johnson, and Phoebe Prillaman.

All of our students deserve to be commended for their great results. A special congratulations to Michael Marotta



and Phoebe Prillaman who scored in the top 25% and Tessa Hackenbracht who scored in the top 5% of students in the greater Lynchburg area. Tessa was one of the top 3 scores on the AMC 12 test for the greater Lynchburg area.

This brought everyone close to the actors, and required blocking and choreography that maximized the view for the most people.

It couldn't have been better. Children and adults alike were mesmerized by this innovative approach and the feeling of being in the action - especially when the Nazis showed up!

regional spelling bee.

About 500 students from across the country compete at the national level, and Jenna is excited to go to D.C. a third time. "It's really fun. The spelling bee is very nerve-wracking, but other than that, I get to enjoy the city and meet new people."

In town to support Jenna was another multi-year champion, Jensen Schram (New Covenant class of 2018). Schram won the 2013 and 2014 News & Advance Regional Spelling Bees and competed in the national competition both years. Jensen said she used to coach Jenna in volleyball and has enjoyed watching her passion for spelling grow as she's gotten older.

Now a sophomore at George Mason University, Jensen said she made some of her best friends at the national spelling bee competition. "I still keep up with all of them," Schram said. "We're all over the country doing amazing things." Jensen said her wins helped create a competitive spirit at New Covenant Schools, and now she's able to share her experience — and thousands of flashcards — with students who are passionate about the spelling bee there.
