MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Covenant students were finally able to see many of their school friends after months of stay-athome restrictions. As the Commonwealth slowly re-opened this summer, **Dayna Renalds** and her team of volunteers successfully re-scheduled our annual Hands & Hearts project which is usually held in the spring.

About 175 students, parents, faculty and staff members spread out in teams to three locations where they spent the morning working.

Army, welcomed by the new Major, who had been on the job only two weeks. In just a few hours, the teams stripped and cleaned the gym floor, trimmed back five truck loads of overhanging trees - and hauled it away; weeded the entire campus; re-painted areas that were deteriorating; pressure-washed the common areas such as patios and verandas; and washed the SA bus. New Covenant was able to offer floor scrubbers, chainsaws, two pressure-washers, and a tractor for the effort. Perhaps the best project was re-painting all the red kettles used by the SA ringers at Christmas.

Tammy Shanks, the Director of Development for the SA said, "It was wonderful to see everyone excited to be together again. We watched students hugging each other as they prepared to work. This day is always a great help to us at the Salvation Army. But it helped our heart even more so this year."

RUSH HOMES

This organization provides affordable housing for those who have disabilities and/or low income. The impact on lives is powerful, and our students get to see it up close as they offer services to residents who are the recipients of these homes. The hosting staff at Rush Homes love our students and were grateful that they could come: "We have not had any groups like New Covenant volunteer since March. It is wonderful to have help at this location."

THE ARC OF VIRGINIA

The ARC is our newest location of service, an organization that provides services to disabled adults who need care during the day. We were not able to get our team into the facility due to on-going covid-19 protocols, but our team was able to gather at New Covenant to make about 100 activity packs for the clients. Each included sensory-motor activities that caregivers can use to enhance learning with their clients.

Our youngest children gathered at New Covenant to plant flowers in many of the beds around the campus. Facilities Manager, **Darren Johnson**, provided about 250 flowers that the children planted. The plants were deeply discounted to the school. Take a look next time you are on campus. Other
