FUNDRAISING, FINANCIAL AID, FOUNDATION: HOW IT WORKS AND WHY IT MATTERS by John Heaton, Headmaster

wish to thank everyone who joined with us in our thirtieth anniversary year by giving to the 30-for-30 Campaign or to the New Covenant Foundation. We have exceeded our goals in both areas by wide margins (see p. 2 for details). With your support we have been able to make significant upgrades to buildings that were first constructed in 2002. Meticulous stewardship has maintained these buildings "like new" and your gifts have made them even more useable on a daily basis for all of our students. We are overwhelmed by your engagement to support acoustical treatments and audiovisual equipment in the Moomaw Center.

In addition, contributions to the New Covenant Foundation have seen record levels of giving for three years in a row, furthering economic diversity in our student body, while providing significant tax credits to those who donate.

At the risk of talking too much about money, we know that there is a significant number of folks for whom fundraising, financial aid, and the New Covenant Foundation, are mysterious. It's too complicated, so why bother? I get it.

Whether you're a donor, a tuition payer, or a recipient of some form of financial aid at New Covenant, however, clarity and transparency may help you understand the values we are seeking to promote and protect. Regardless of where you find yourself in our community, there is something in this article for you, so read on.

HOW FUNDRAISING WORKS

New Covenant seeks to underwrite 100% of its operating expenses through tuition charged. Budgets are usually set a year in advance without actual knowledge of how many students will be

LIVE STREAMING CAPABILITIES



ADVANCING IN ARTISTIC ABILITY

All students at New Covenant participate in art media classes from the youngest of grades. Michael Dunaway, our art instructor, runs the busiest room in the school, as nearly 100% of our students see him each week.

Much of artistic creation has less to with the hand and more to do with the eye. Advancing in artistic ability is predicated upon learning to see, to observe. "If students learn how to observe, the hand will catch up," remarked Mr. Dunaway. By fifth grade many students become disillusioned with art because they begin to notice that their pictures don't look like the models in front of them. They tend to want to give up, so it's important to teach them how to overcome this developmental impediment.

Here's a recent project that illustrates the point. Students in middle school (5th-8th grade) were give one half of a picture of a human face. They were asked to replicate the face on the blank side of the paper, hardly an easy task. "We break it down into steps," said Mr. Dunaway, "and you'd be surprised what a young student can do." Students are first taught how to measure proportions, mapping out distinguishing points surrounding the features on the face. Next, students converted the 3-dimensional



contours or edges of the face and its features into 2-dimensional lines by connecting the points previously measured. Finally, they observed the light source and resulting shadows to create the correct values given the face form using various shading techniques.

The end result is that it is very difficult to distinguish between the pieces that were done by fifth graders and those rendered by older students.

IMPORTANT TIPS FOR ART FAIR SUBMISSIONS:

- Students in K-12th grade may submit TWO PIECES of art in each of the listed categories.
- Student work grades 4-12 will be in the **judged** art show.
- All submissions should be given directly to Mr. Dunaway.
- Flat (2D) submissions should NOT be folded or on lined paper.
- Submissions MUST be unframed.
- All photography should be printed on photo quality paper (preferably 8 ½ x 11 or larger).
- Sculpture (3D) submissions should stand upright OR student should provide a base on which to stand the piece.
- Lego submissions will NOT be accepted.
- ALL pieces should be the **creation** of the student(s).
- Multiple students may collaborate on a single submission.

TUITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (TAP)

As a reminder, the deadline to apply for our Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) for the 2021-22 school year is January 31, 2021—only six days away! The link to access FACTS tuition assistance applications is https://online.factsmgt.com/aid. When applying, you will be asked to submit your 2019 tax returns. The fee to apply is \$35, and is charged by FACTS, not the school.

Students in Grades 2-9 will sit for CTP-5 Testing this **Tuesday through Friday**, **January 26-29**. Please help your children have the best experience by bringing them to school on time, and avoiding unnecessary appointments, absences, and early dismissals.

CHANGE TO QUARANTINE POLICY

n accordance with the CDC and our local public health department, New Covenant has now adjusted its quarantine policy for NON-RESIDENTIAL EXPOSURE. Our existing practice has been to quarantine all exposures for 14 days, even if a negative test is produced. Current guidance from the CDC adjusts this to 10 days IF there are no symptoms. We will require that an individual obtains a negative PCR test after at least 7 days from exposure. A negative test in that situation has a very statistically low rate of transmission. The key, however, is isolated

exposure; in other words, it applies in situations where the exposure is not sharing the home. All family members who were exposed must also meet the negative symptom and test criteria before anyone can return early.

We ask that you contact the medical staff with any instances of exposure or symptoms, and they will help you determine the appropriate actions for your particular situation.

enrolled. We usually get close, but in some years our numbers may vary between 96% to 105%. Budget shortfalls, when they occur, are usually covered easily by the Annual Fund. Our primary purpose for the Annual Fund, however, is to fund projects like the ones mentioned above. Our normal practice is not to rely upon fundraising for operating expenses.

HOW FINANCIAL AID WORKS

The founders of our school desired that our student body resemble an average healthy church congregation: "red and yellow, black and white"; affluent, middle class or disadvantaged. We want as much diversity as can reasonably be achieved. Thus, from the beginning the school built a tuition assistance program (we call it TAP) into yearly budgets. Those funds are dispersed to qualified families who apply for them, and the current level of commitment is in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

WHY IT MATTERS

This naturally puts *upward* pressure on tuition rates. Hence, the New Covenant Foundation was established. This foundation makes it easier for money to be donated for qualifying students outside the operating budget because donors to the foundation receive a 65% tax credit from the Commonwealth, and as much as 35% tax deduction on federal taxes, depending on other variables. When the foundation is strongly supported, as we have seen for the last several years, it shifts the TAP burden away from the operating budget, and thus creates *downward* pressure on tuition rates.

This is one reason (among many) that tuition rates have remained flat for two years running. Whether you are a donor, a tuition payer, or a recipient of financial assistance (some folks are all three!), everyone benefits from healthy support of the Annual Fund and the Foundation. Donors enjoy significant tax benefits from their gifts, tuition holds steady, and we meet our goal of economic diversity by adequately funding financial aid. When we celebrate broad financial support in our community, our purpose is to encourage you and to express our gratitude for our many friends who share our vision of classical, Christian education.
