f we were to imagine what our children will be ten or fifteen years from now, our list might include such things as, graduating from college, getting married, starting a family, or finding and succeeding at a job. When your children are grammar or middle school age, such thoughts are difficult to bring into sharp focus. Even parents of high school students may put off thinking about much beyond the immediate steps of life after New Covenant.

Our faculty, however, thinks about it a lot. We have formulated a "portrait," a visionary picture of your child, not so much related to what he or she will do after graduation, but more of what he or she will be at age 40. Every faculty member is tasked with contributing to the

formation of virtue in the lives of our students. This can only happen in a context of supportive relationships, trust and genuine love for one another.

Our Hands & Hearts project is designed to strengthen the connection between students and teachers, to develop trust, and to promote healthy, caring relationships. As we get ready to spread out across Lynchburg next week, I'm emphasizing to our students and teachers that we're not just taking a day off from school, we're actually still "doing school," but we're following a very different lesson plan.
