

COMPREHENSIVE TEST PROGRAM (CTP-5): WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

ach year, just after our return from Christmas break, student in grades 2-9 take standardized tests from the Educational Records Bureau (ERB). The tests are called CTP-5, the fifth version of the Comprehensive Test Program. You might wonder why we invest the time for these assessments and what we can learn from the tests. Many of you want most of all to know how to prepare your student for these assessments.

First, the CTP5 is a test of achievement, a measure of what students have mastered, not a test of ability or "IQ". The test questions are

written by a committee of educators at the ERB. While the content is not a perfect match for what our classical and Christian curriculum emphasizes, it is a good one. For example, it includes subtests which measure verbal and mathematical reasoning, abilities we specifically target through logic, Latin and math classes. Rather than measuring a student's knowledge of exactly what we teach as our regular testing in school does, CTP gives us the opportunity to compare the performance of our students to the performance of other students on the same items. SCHOOL CLOSING OR DELAY

All information regarding school-wide closings or delays related to weather will be communicated via email as well as reported to ABC News 13 and their online closings list. A decision to close or delay school will be made by the Headmaster by 6:00am. If you are unable to get to school because of unplowed roads, your child's absence will be excused. Please note that our families and faculty are spread out over several counties; therefore, our decision to delay or cancel may be based on conditions different from those you see outside your own home.

IMPORTANT ADMISSIONS UPDATE

January is the time of year when re-enrollment takes place for next school year. Because we operate on continuous enrollment contracts, your student is automatically reenrolled—there is nothing for you to do. Your child's seat is protected, and the admissions office will contact you at some point to update in FACTS any personal information that may have changed. If you have moved, changed your email, or added a new permission for pick-up – all of those things should be updated annually so that we can serve you well. This update of information is completed through the Enrollment Packet.

If you are certain, however, that your child will not return in the 2023-24 school year, you have until **February 1, 2023** to notify **Linda Hackenbracht** in the Finance Office. We ask that you do this right away so that you are not subject to additional charges. The Continuous Enrollment Fee of \$150 will be charged to your account on that date if you do not opt out. If your plans are uncertain, you should also contact the office right away to clarify your situation.

New Covenant is experiencing higher than normal applications for admission. The kindergarten class for 2023 is full and was formed on December 10, a full two months earlier than any in the history of the school. There are wait pools—some are deep—in every Grammar and Middle School grade except rising 6th. It is important, therefore, that you communicate with the school if there is any issue regarding enrollment for 2023-24. We want to continue to serve every one of our families as well as prospective families who are seeking placement for their children.

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Spring Break will explain more about the groups of students against whom we measure ourselves, as well as telling you how your student performed. These tests are not used to make decisions about grade or class placements.

Our faculty and administrators do use the test results, particularly those of whole groups, to evaluate the effectiveness of our curriculum and instruction. For example, if a whole class scores lower than we are satisfied with on a section of the test related, say, to punctuation, we may decide to increase

the amount of time we give to those concepts in the classroom. Thus, the tests not only evaluate our students, but provide a monitor for how our curriculum is mapped and



delivered in the classroom.

During the week of testing, our teachers strive to create environments that are low-stress. We schedule the tests over a period of days so that we don't spend all day on them. We also provide adequate time for breaks. Homework in the Middle and Grammar Schools may be adjusted as well, and we don't skip "specials," things like art, music, PE and exploratory, which require different types of thinking and activity than standardized tests, and thus provide purposeful rest.

The most important thing you as a parent can do to set up your child for success is to get them to school on time or early on each test day. Students who are tardy may not be able to enter their classrooms immediately if timed testing has already begun; instead they will wait in the lobby or clinic until there is a break. They don't need extra motivational treats, but they do need a healthy breakfast, snack, and lunch to keep their energy high. They do not need additional school supplies, but they do need to come to school with the expectation of a balanced and happy day, not a day filled with stress or anxiety about performance. We can help them enjoy the process by seeing it as one part of their education, not a high-stakes hurdle

to clear.

Finally, our long experience with the CTP-5 confirms to us that not every student performs at the same level. Students may score higher in one area and lower in another.

The tests are extremely good at assessing our students accurately. This is one time of year when we remind ourselves of our "Portrait of the Graduate" which reads in part: "A New Covenant student meets success with humility and failure with confidence." As a parent you should know that we use the times of assessment to put this motto into practice, teaching into the lives of our students so that they make the right moral response to their performance.

CTP tests begin on Tuesday, January 17, and, depending on the grade level, may continue through Friday, January 20.
