

ART & SCIENCE FAIR: PERCEIVING AND PROBLEM-SOLVING

ach year New Covenant sponsors the Art & Science Fair, and both events take place concurrently. This week's QUID NOVI reports the results (see p. 2).

The dual nature of the event engages students in two different ways. Those who submit compositions for the Art Fair are largely engaged in what we call "perceiving," that is, they are creating original works in a particular medium—clay, paint, photography, etc. Years ago, now-retired art teacher Sarah Mays explained to me that "if you could learn to write your name, you could learn to draw." That includes just

about everybody. So why don't more students go on to achieve some level of competency with art? She went on to observe that "around fifth grade, students begin to see that their compositions don't look like what they might be copying. The first impulse is to say, 'I can't draw,' and give up entirely."

Art instruction is critical for students at this point, and it's one reason we continue to require art all the way into the high school years. Art is about learning to look, learning to observe, to see what is there and to create the shapes and spaces before you. In short, even the beginner can apprehend

MEN'S AND WOMEN'S VARSITY BASKETBALL FINISH HISTORIC SEASONS

or the first time in New Covenant Schools' history, both the Men's and the Women's Varsity basketball teams participated in the Virginia Independent School Athletic Association (VISAA) tournament which concluded last weekend. New Covenant is a Division IV school, but our conference often requires us to play schools in higher divisions.

The men's team turned in an outstanding season with 18 wins and 10 losses, beating Division II schools like VES, or losing by a mere 2 points, as it did against North Cross. The men advanced to the State Semi-finals and notched the school's first VISAA state playoff win. During the season, they scored 7 wins against

On the women's side, the team finished with 13 wins and 12 losses, winning games they needed to win, and showing real grit the whole way. By season's end they were ranked high enough for the tournament, and advanced to VISAA state quarterfinals. The women had 6 season wins against teams included in VISAA state playoffs, the most important being their "upset" win in first round of the tournament.

At tournament time, our women won their first round game and advanced to the Quarterfinals. Last Wednesday the women's team faced Roanoke Catholic taking the game all the way to the final 30 seconds. After staging a comeback from being down 12 points to the #2 ranked Celtics, they lost in heartbreaking fashion by only 2 points. **Brielle Walker** had 17 points and **Olivia Kidd** had 13.

beauty for its own sake, and participate in it

One of the great emphases of classical, Christian education is to acquaint students with truth, goodness, and beauty. Of the three, beauty is the most non-cognitive. When we look at a beautiful landscape, or stand before the ocean, or look a particular piece of art, we receive it as a whole. We take it in all at once. In short, we experience it, but we do not have to analyze it to be moved by it. Of course, we can analyze such things, but in doing so we should not miss the joy that is had by simply appreciating it with nothing else in view.

The Science Fair as conducted at New Covenant is another unique inclusion in our curriculum. Long ago we charted a course away from the kind of fair that relied upon student research with the results published in a static fashion on a foam board. While that can be a


fruitful way to conduct a Science Fair, we wanted to challenge the students in the moment, by placing a problem before them that they had to solve under a timed challenge. After students form their teams (note the self-selected names!), each grade level is given materials with which to address a particular challenge. This year for example, some students were tasked with making a structure that would withstand the shock of a simulated earthquake, generated by a special "shake" board. Others were given popsicle sticks and glue with which they had to create a bridge that would sustain the load of increased amounts of weight. Still others were charged with creating a boat designed to carry maximum weight without sinking.

These and other challenges require the team to collaborate, design and build their projects with limited materials and limited time. It mimics that great moment on the Apollo 13 moon mission when, in the wake of a near-catastrophic failure in the cryo-tanks, engineers on the ground had to figure out how to "scrub" increasing amounts of carbon dioxide from inside the lunar module. Sitting around a large table at mission control, the engineers were given every piece of equipment available to the astronauts in space, and were tasked with creating an additional filter which could then be replicated inside the spacecraft—all before the astronauts were unconscious! Okay. The stakes are never that high in our Science Fair, but the exercise is instructive for problem-solving, managing time, and working together productively under a little pressure.

Our combined Art & Science Fair provides the opportunity for students to stretch themselves in how they perceive the world, and how they solve problems that confront them. We congratulate the winners listed in the *Honoraria*.
