

ST. FRANCIS—DEVOTED TO GOD AND HIS CREATION

"For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Matthew 6.21

e lived in my grandmother's side yard under a sprawling magnolia and surrounded by ivy.

She buried a long line of deceased beagles and an occasional parakeet next to him among the tangled vines. He was blotched with mold and weatherstained. Yet he stood there timeless, an enigma to a little boy whose life had been carefully purged of statuary and especially "yard art." He was St. Francis.

Raised a thoroughgoing Presbyterian, all I knew about Francis was what I could intuit from that concrete statue. He had a funny haircut, wore a bathrobe, and had birds on his shoulders and bunnies around his feet. Perhaps he was an early prototype to the Dr. Doolittle that I was familiar with.

As I grew older and entered formal education, in Church History I learned that Francis began his unique mission at a time when the Western Church was gripped by division, decadence and heresy. The

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church was a close-run thing somewhere between being endorsed by Pope Innocent III and being condemned as another sect of radicals. By the end of the 13th century, Francis was part of the "Friars Minor." These friars had reached to every corner of Christendom and had become one of the most influential movements in church and university, and also a fixture in the fabric of medieval Europe.

Francis committed his life, and the lives of his companions, "To follow the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ and to walk in his footsteps." Poverty, chastity and obedience had been the marks of the monastic life for almost a millennia before the arrival of Francis. Francis took it a step further. The Friars Minor would be mendicant, travelling or homeless, and they could only provide for their needs by begging alms. In this way Francis sought the way of the cross, the way of the apostles, the way of Christ. And in the end he received the "stigmata," the six marks of Jesus' suffering.

But what can we make of Francis?
G. K. Chesterton wrote his book
St. Francis hoping his readers could "at least get a glimmering of why the poet who praised his lord the sun, often hid himself in a dark cavern, of why the saint who was so gentle with his Brother the Wolf was so harsh to his Brother the

Ass (as he nicknamed his own body), of why the troubadour who said that love set his heart on fire separated himself from women, of why the singer who rejoiced in the strength and gaiety of the fire deliberately rolled himself in the snow." The key, says Chesterton, is to understand that Francis was the greatest of the troubadours, the professional poets, musicians and lovers of the Middle Ages. His, however, was no earthly love, nor was his Beloved a lady of high

estate. The object of his devotion was God himself, and the beauties Francis proclaimed were heaven and earth, mountains and oceans, snow and heat, animals and human beings.

Francis blessed the animals. We will bless the animals on October 6, and we hope you will come. But it would be a mistake to think that Francis blessed the animals because he was a devoted pet owner. He didn't own anything, not even his own body. He blessed them because they, like he, had been made by the most desirable One of all, God himself. In blessing them, he blessed the One who made them in all their wondrous variety. Let us bless the Lord. Thanks be to God.
