- The National Cathedral and the Basilica
- National Gallery of Art
- Holocaust Museum
- The Bible Museum
- The African American Museum

So much of what we see and hear in these wonderful locations allows us to put 'flesh on the bone' to what the students are learning in the classroom. We are able to: (1) focus on American history through the museum of that same name, as well as through the Library of Congress and the Monument Walk; (2) focus on art and architecture through the Gallery tour, the National Cathedral, and again, through a deep consideration of the monuments, where questions naturally arise such as 'What is the purpose of a monument?' and 'How does this monument propose to memorialize this person or event?' and 'What values are we venerating?'; and

(3) focus on the Church and the Scripture through visiting the Cathedral, the Basilica and the Bible Museum.

Though the Holocaust Museum has been a regular of the senior trip, this year, for the first time, we were able to add the African American Museum. This, frankly, made for a heavy day for the seniors and their chaperones as it made vivid the horrors of what fallen humanity is capable of. But we must honestly face history and the profound truism that ideas have consequences. Indeed, this was particularly poignant in our hearts and minds since less than 48 hours later, Hamas terrorists brutally murdered Israeli citizens—the largest death toll of the Jewish people since the Holocaust.

Because this is an overnight trip, we are afforded the opportunity to engage in an evening event and this year, for the first time since COVID, we returned to the Kennedy Center where we were treated to a captivating performance by

the National Symphony Orchestra. This is a spectacular venue, and the experience was enhanced by the fact that many of our students were seated in the first two rows. Though we might grant that symphonic music is not high on most of our students' Spotify playlists, they did a marvelous job leaning into that experience, appreciating the incredible musicianship on display.

The Washington, DC trip is just one of many extraordinary opportunities in a student's career at New Covenant. Few schools make this kind of field trip even once during high school. We are pleased to make this a staple of the New Covenant experience.
