
Middle School Toy Drive and School of Rhetoric Food Drive

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to the good news of his coming—rejoicing! As we plan our classroom activities for the days leading up to the holidays, we look for meaningful ways to shape the affections of children, leading them to respond to Christ’s advent with joy and generosity.

Each year during the Advent season, our little ones are challenged to develop generosity and richness in good works – virtues we note in our Portrait of the Graduate. In the Grammar School, each grade level chooses a project in which the children can participate, and which will benefit others outside of their classroom. They get to feel very grown-up as they take on the role of helping others.

This year’s list of projects starts with serving those in our own school community. Pre-K and Kindergarten will shower love and appreciation on our school staff members: those who

work mostly behind the scenes to feed students, to keep the building clean, and to keep things running smoothly. The children will gather small gifts and treats, arrange them in festive containers, and deliver them to our kitchen, custodial and support staff members.

Recognizing the importance of caring for folks in difficulty, recovering from surgery or receiving nursing home care, first grade is gathering gifts and supplies for Lynchburg Health and Rehabilitation Center. They will include handmade pictures and notes to brighten the days of those who are working to overcome physical and life challenges.

The Agape Center is a community of volunteers who seek to create a sense of belonging for those in need. They provide mentoring, food, clothing and household necessities – delivered with love. Students in second and third grades

will collect and donate cleaning supplies and fun items for birthday baskets, to be distributed by the ministry.

Daily Bread provides meals with respect and without condition, for all comers. Their dining room is a welcoming place to sit down and eat for folks in our downtown area. Fourth graders are filling lunch bags for them to distribute.

Parents, many thanks for the items you are sending in for these projects and the time you devote to helping out at school. You are making it possible for children to learn a bit of generosity. Our hope is that these gifts will benefit not just those who receive them, but also those who give them.
