I think I recite the Galatians passage to myself every day. After two decades of soul-shaping work at New Covenant Schools, these three quotes are intimately connected

in my mind. At the risk of hyperbole, I am going to argue that one can glean the meaning of life through these three statements, or perhaps more precisely, answer the question, "How ought I then to live?"

#### **BWXT INTERNSHIPS**

the expansion of choice and freedom of experience beyond the walls of their current station in life. You also understand their fear—the expansion of choice and the responsibility that comes with it. These young adults realize that their responsibilities and, importantly, the consequences attached to them, are wide and deep. And so, although these wise words continue to be a comfort to me as I grow older, I think of these quotes with those students in mind as they face a myriad of questions: Where should I go to college? or Do I even want to go to college? What would I study if I did go? What career might I choose and how are those two things aligned? Will I be able to afford a place to live and cover all the financial responsibilities of living an independent life? Whom will I marry and what if I don't end up in the right place to meet them? One can go on and on and eventually become paralyzed with this train of thought—how I am supposed to know how to live?

Freedom: I think this is one of the greatest gifts we can pass on to young people. The Galatians passage reminds us that in Christ we are free. I think of this as both a freedom from and a freedom to. In Christ, we can be free from the false gods of, say wealth and fame. We can gladly receive them if they come our way, but we need not cling to them as the pillars of a well-lived life because they are fickle and fragile and will fail us one and all. In Christ, we are more than free from such things, we are free to engage in true life, a life that is well encapsulated by the other two quotes.

Love your family: Take that in the most literal sense, first and foremost, and then expand it to include those with whom you walk, whether your neighbors or those at work, school, church, or on your sports team. This is the great call on your life, and it is no small mission. Wake up in the morning and ask yourself, What



is it that I should be about this very day? We all want to live lives of meaning (to 'change the world') and here is our means for doing so. Love. Acts of love. Words of love

Virtue: We all hope that if faced with a great heroic moment, we will find the inner courage to match (perhaps we would be the ones to run into the burning building to save those trapped within), but I would argue that is an irrelevant and frankly distracting mode of thought for two reasons. First, the chances that such an outwardly heroic moment comes your way are slim to none, and thus your opportunity to express virtue must be in the normal course of life. Second, there is no fake it to make it principle when it comes to being a virtuous person. It is an acquired skill that comes from habit and practice, and it must be done so in the daily grind of life.

And herein is the overall import of these wise words, the answer to the question posed above—How ought I then

to live? It is right there in front of me!
The good life, a life of meaning, is to walk freely, in Christ, loving those whom the Lord sets before me, speaking and acting with virtue within the normal confines of daily life. That's it! We are still left with choices, of course, some quite large—school, career, and spouse. But what you do in those moments of large choice will be shaped by the hundreds of little choices you make along the way. So I urge my students to be free, love those around you, and practice the virtue you espouse.


