presented as 'BC' and 'AD.' Each of these places the most important event in the story at the beginning, and count forward and backward from there. The point being that all subsequent time and the events occurring in that time must be understood in light of the inaugural impetus.

Christians, like the Jews, did one better than counting years from the beginning. They counted the seasons according to an annual celebration of God's revolutionary act within time and space. Passover was the spring feast in which the Jews remembered their release from 400 years of bondage, but it was also the reference point from which other feasts like Booths and Weeks would be calculated. Likewise, Christians from the very beginning of our story began counting the whole year according to Easter. Christians declared that Easter was the greater Passover and replaced the former as a shadow. So Paul could write to the Corinthians, "Cleanse out the old leaven that you may be a new lump, as you really are unleavened. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed for us. Let us therefore celebrate the festival, not with the old leaven, the leaven of malice and evil, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth." Easter was the center of the year and the center of the Christian life.

But by the 4th century, Christians began keeping the week before Easter as 'Holy Week,' seven days set aside from the rest of the year to meditate solely upon the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus for the life of the world. And within that holiest week, three days that make up the triduum sacrum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

Beginning with Palm Sunday, the intent of this calendar was to invite the Christian community to participate in the last, great moments of the life of Christ. The passion accounts from each of the four gospels


Those newly converted Christians or others who had been excluded from the company of the church for grievous sin made their last preparations to be admitted into the people of God. At sundown they were dressed in white linen robes, and were greeted by choirs singing hymns of praise in the candlelit churches, where they would be baptized or restored to the community of faith. All of this led up to the delight of the Easter Communion service proclaiming, "Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed!"

The great American industrialist Lee lacocca wrote, "If you want to make good use of your time, you've got to know what's most important and then give it all you've got." For 2,000 years Christians have been saying that the death and resurrection of
were read in their entirety during the week. Maundy Thursday was named after the mandare, Jesus' new commandment given to his disciples that they should love one another in the same way that he would love them. As late as the 16th century, the kings and queens of England would wash the feet of their poorest subjects gathered in Westminster Abbey, and even into the 19th century they gave alms to the poor. The Lord's Supper was celebrated with the greatest solemnity, commemorating his last meal at Passover with his closest friends. The mood of the service on Good Friday changed from the warm intimacy of the upper room to the stark suffering of the Lord upon the cross. The altars in the churches were bare and the people offered prayers for the conversion of the nations, the ending of wars and peace among all men. And finally, the quiet stillness of the tomb hung over the devotions of Holy Saturday.
