

#### Dearest NCS Community,

A hearty welcome to the catalogue of J-Term offerings for January 2025. You will, of course, want to know *what's next - what do we do with this catalogue?* Great question:

- First and foremost, we invite all SOR students and their parents to read through *all* of the course descriptions to get a sense of the range of options.
- Second, please do note several important details:
  - o Make sure you review the pre-req/restrictions section to make sure you are eligible, and the fees section, as some courses do require that.
  - o The catalogue is organized into three sections, full-day, morning and afternoon.
  - o There is only one full-day offering Peaks and Vistas of Virginia
- Third, you should rank order your desired choices so that when it comes time to register, you are ready to go. Specifically,
  - You should be ready to list your top 3 choices for the morning and top 3 choices for the
    afternoon session. Unless you are in one of the categories below, all students will be on
    campus all day so they will take two courses thus we want your top 3 choices for both
    sessions.
  - SCUBA/Dive trip You have already chosen your J-Term, so please register for this course only when the time comes.
  - o Internships If you have set up an internship you will need to turn in your Internship Intent Form by October 7<sup>th</sup> and sign up for the internship during registration. However, if it is not full-day, you will go ahead and choose your top 3 for the time frame you will be back on campus (morning or afternoon).
  - Peaks and Vistas If you desire to engage this course, when you get to registration you will select it, but then we will still ask you to rank order your top choices for morning and afternoon. The Peaks and Vistas course has limited space and if you don't get that one, we need to know where else to place you.
- Finally, registration will occur on-line during specified windows. Each grade, sequentially, will
  receive a Microsoft Forms link and on that form will select their choices according to what was just
  specified. Regarding the timing of the registration process:
  - o Seniors October 10th 11th
  - o Juniors October 17<sup>th</sup> & 18<sup>th</sup>
  - o Sophomores October 24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup>
  - o Freshman October 30th & 31th

As classes fill, we will notify the next group of students and remove those from the choices so that underclassman can realign their preferences. As you review these offerings, if you have particular questions about the course content or fees or travel, etc., please direct those to the listed teacher. If you have general questions about the J-Term, please send those my way.

# SCUBA on Blackbeard's Dive Boat in the Bahamas

# **Description:**

Since 2015, NCS has been pleased to offer our students an opportunity to be in awe of God's creative majesty found in the underwater world. It's a joyful wonder to be exposed to the vibrant colors, mind-bending shapes, and calm serenity within which God has orchestrated the most fundamental food chain and highest oxygen producing system on the planet. It's also an awakening to the very real dangers that this marine environment is facing because of the current practices of human civilization. Many students have gone on from this experience to further involvement in employment opportunities, conservation programs, as well as life-long recreational enjoyment of the underwater world.

In this 2024-25 iteration of our SCUBA Club, we will once again partner with Fluvanna Dive Center for the Open Water Diver Certification. Larry Antonacci and Shushawn Touryan Schmal will be responsible for the oversight of all PADI Open Water Certification Training as Dive Instructors. They will also use their significant experience to act as our travel agency for the J-Term Trip on Blackbeard's Liveaboard, as well as resourcing the NCS chaperones. Rest assured, NCS chaperones will be present and involved in the dive training and will lead the dive trip. This will be my third trip with NCS on Blackbeard's Liveaboard. I can confidently say that this trip offers a perfect combination of boat life and underwater exploration very few get the chance to experience!

#### Length:

- Friday, January 3, 2025, is classroom preparation day
- Saturday, January 4-10, 2025, travel to and from The Bahamas from Lynchburg, VA

# **Travel:**

 There will be airline travel from Lynchburg to Nassau, Bahamas, then berth on AllStar Liveaboard Blackbeard's 65-foot dive boat.

# Fees:

• \$3250.00 per participant. Cost includes airfare, checked baggage fee, roundtrip transportation to Nassau Marina, all meals/snacks/drinks on the boat, crew Divemaster, crew gratuity, all fees instituted by the Bahamian Government, gear rental (BCD, regulator, dive computer, wetsuit, dive light).

- Students will want to bring money for food purchases in airports and any souvenirs they purchase on Blackbeard's or in the Bahamas. Be advised that digital forms of payment are becoming more mandatory in lieu of cash.
- For entry into the country, the Bahamas requires a valid U.S. Passport that will not expire within 6 months of the stated travel time. Passport costs have been updated for 2024:
   Adult Passport \$165 Minor Passport (Under 16) \$135 Renewal \$130
- Cost does not include mandatory Dive Accident Insurance and Travel Insurance. Divers Alert Network (DAN) is the industry standard for Dive Insurance and is suggested as a means of acquiring both types of insurance. Base package costs are estimated at \$205 (Individual Membership \$40, Dive Insurance \$42, Travel Insurance \$123, age dependent).

- 16 Participants and 2 Chaperones
- PADI Open Water SCUBA Certification or equivalent is required to dive



# The Peaks and Vistas of Virginia

### **Description:**

Here in Central Virginia, we are blessed to be surrounded by some of the best hikes and views in the country as well as more miles of the Appalachian Trail than any other state. This course will offer students the opportunity to hike portions of the Appalachian Trail and visit some beautiful peaks within a day's drive of Lynchburg. Not for the faint of heart (or of legs), this course will involve 30-40 miles of hiking and many feet of elevation gain to get to this impressive views.

### Length:

This course will run on full days, totaling 42 hours.

# **Travel:**

• Daily travel not to extend beyond the school day with the exception of Monday, January 13, which will involve an early departure and late return.

### Fees:

• There is a \$25 fee for this course.

# **Pre-requisites/Restrictions**

- Students should have the ability to hike 5-10 miles a day with some elevation gain.
- Students should also dress warmly and have appropriate footwear for hiking.
- Maximum of 14 students in this course.

# Around the World in Seven Dishes

### **Description:**

Food tells a special story. Food connects us. Food transports us. In this course, we will "travel" to seven different countries through the power of cooking. Not only will students learn essential kitchen skills, but they will also learn about various cultures and their cooking styles. We will first discover the unique qualities of each destination including history, art, and literature. Then we will build a meal around the stories told of the country. We will end each meeting by eating the meal which we have prepared, sharing stories of our own. This course hopes to restore what Michael Pollan describes as a "return to the kitchen to reclaim our lost traditions and to forge a deeper, more meaningful connection to the ingredients and cooking techniques that we use to nourish ourselves."

# **Description:**

As a high school student, you already have a wealth of core memories tucked away in the corners of your heart and mind. Waiting to be mined, these memories come to life through the genre of personal memoir. Quite unlike rhetorical analysis, the well-crafted illustrative memoir contains strong imagery that invites readers to join you in your proverbial walk down memory lane. Once polished, the personal memoir can be gifted to a loved one or even used for a college admissions essay.

# Pre-requisites/Restrictions

Maximum of 18 students in this course.

- Laying the groundwork: Why take the time to write about yourself and your experiences?
   How does the writing process serve the author? How might your memoir best serve others?
- Finding beauty. Does beauty exist in every memory? How can we find beauty in the most difficult of human experiences? Are words inherently powerful, and if so are they inherently beautiful? How do writers craft beautiful sentences?
- Listening well. What is the connection between listening well and writing well? What is the essential posture of a good listener? A good writer? Does one need to be a good listener to be a good writer?
- Leveraging your story: What are the common threads in your childhood or teenage experiences? How can you leverage the "common to man" threads of your story to bless others?
- Reflecting glory: How do you, oh human, reflect the image of God? Does what you behold determine what you become? How does understanding ourselves as imago dei of a Creator God impact our understanding of ourselves in the world?



# Geography of Tea: Camellia sinensis across the globe

# **Description:**

The leaves of the *Camellia sinensis* plant are brewed daily in every inhabited continent, some varieties as common as water and some valued more per pound than the most precious elements on earth. Tea defines cultures and remains an integral expression of hospitality across the world. For 3,000 years, tea (Camellia sinensis) was confined to East Asia, and with each century, tea became more and more rooted into their daily cultures and rituals. It remained there until the first tea leaves were brought to Europe in the 17th century. The growing appetite for tea in the West had global effects, beginning with the Opium Wars, leading to plant smuggling, formation of the East India Company and birth of a global economy, and even a protest that launched the American Revolution.

Given its indelible mark on human history, we will explore the teas that define our world both through sensory experiences and cultural practices. We will learn about the geographical features and historical background that influenced the spread of tea through these diverse regions. Non-camellia sinensis teas like rooibos and yerba mate are included by virtue of their similar usage in the southern hemisphere. Each day we will examine loose-leaf teas to understand their preparation and production. We will learn to properly steep the leaves, add additional ingredients like spices and herbs, and sample foods that often accompany the beverage. Together we will gain understanding and appreciation for the power these small leaves have exerted over civilizations past and present.

# **Give My Regards To Broadway**

# **Description:**

Why are Broadway musicals so popular? How do they both reflect and influence American culture? This course will study the rise and development of Broadway musicals, discussing the elements of musical theater (plot, characters, songs, and dances) and examining the Broadway style as it was created and has changed over time. We will accomplish this by watching videos of several Broadway classics, analyzing and critiquing each show, building an understanding of the Broadway musical style and the factors that keep Americans flocking to New York and the "Great White Way."

# **Pre-requisites/Restrictions**

Maximum of 18 students in this course.

- We first look at the history of musicals with a focus on the early days of Broadway.
  - O What and where is Broadway?
  - o 19<sup>th</sup>-century musical influences on Broadway shows
- We will watch and critique four Broadway shows, as listed below, that represent the best musicals of their period, looking at plot, character development, and themes, and how song and dance contribute to these.
- We will then compare the shows, considering the changes in Broadway styles over time as well as what elements are consistent.
  - o Early Broadway (1900-1943): *42<sup>nd</sup> Street*
  - o Classic Broadway (1943-1965): Oklahoma!
  - o Broadway and Changing Themes: West Side Story
  - Broadway and Changing Styles: Phantom of the Opera
- We will also briefly discuss other musicals, most of which are already familiar to most people, that have contributed to the changing landscape of Broadway through the years.



# A Guide to the World Religions

### **Description:**

This course will be an introduction to the basic teachings, practices, and history of the major world religions (Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism) as well as, time allowing, an introduction to smaller faith traditions (ie Shinto and Baha'i). Attention will also be given to the nature of orthodoxy and heterodoxy within each religion, as well as a focused discussion of forms of mysticism within each religion. The goal of studying these faiths is to understand the worldviews represented within these diverse religious traditions and to recognize the way religion influences other areas of human life. In addition, understanding other religious beliefs enables us as Christians to better understand our own faith, as well as be better able to articulate why we believe what we believe and don't believe much of what other faiths teach.

### Length:

• This course will run on half-days, totaling 21 hours.

# **Travel:**

Travel would be to visit with members of other faiths in the Lynchburg area to learn first-hand about the religious traditions we are studying. Greater Lynchburg Islamic
Association, Agudath Sholom Synagogue in Lynchburg, BAPS Shri Swaminarayan Mandir
Hindu temple in Salem, St George Greek Orthodox Church in Lynchburg, and others are
potential sites to visit.

# **Woodworking Course**

At Vector Space, Lynchburg

# Description:

This course provides an opportunity for teens to learn beginner and intermediate woodworking techniques. Vector Space is a non-profit makerspace dedicated to hands-on education for teens and adults. Led by retired engineer and wood craftsman Des Black and Vector Space founder Elise Spontarelli, the goals of this course are to ignite a love of making and build confidence in the wood shop for each student. Participants will begin by learning to read and interpret detailed plans and tool safety training. Throughout the course, students will learn more advanced techniques and use both hand and power tools to build three independent projects. Project will go home with students at the end of the program.

# Length:

• This course will run on half-days, totaling 21 hours.

# Travel:

Students will travel each day to and from the Vector Space facility by NCS bus.

# Fees

- The fee for this course is \$225 which covers transportation to and from the Vector Space facility, materials used therein and the on-site instructor.
- All supplies, safety equipment, and materials are provided.

# Pre-requisites/Restrictions

- No prior woodworking experience is required.
- Max of 8 students. Min of 4 students needed for this offering.
- Students will receive further instruction on dress code and other considerations once enrolled in the class.

- Tools used during this course will include chop saw, bandsaw, table saw, hand chisel, router table, belt sander, drill, orbital sander, square, clamps, and measuring and marking tools.
- Projects will include a cutting board, napkin holder, and fruit bowl. There will be an
  opportunity for some customization and decision making on the part of the student when
  creating their projects.

Survey data from the end of 2022 suggest that 37% of American households do not have enough money in the bank to make it through even one month, if they lost their main source of income. Total national student loans went from \$500 billion to \$1.7 trillion in the 16 years between 2006 and 2022. Average credit card debt in the Commonwealth of Virginia is \$7,663. Too many people, young and old, are making financial choices without the benefit of financial literacy - this course is designed to help students avoid that pitfall!

# Go Into the Desert

# **Description:**

"Go into the desert not to escape other men, but in order to find them in God"- Thomas Merton. This course will examine the Desert Fathers in the third century AD. These early monastics devoted themselves to a life of prayer, poverty, and self-denial. The Desert Fathers had a profound influence on Christian monasticism and spirituality. This influence can be seen in the Rule of St. Benedict and the Hesychast tradition of the Eastern Church. By learning about the lives of these monastics and reading their sayings from The Desert Fathers: Sayings of the Early Christian Monks, we will see how the call to the desert applies today.

# Length:

This course will run on half-days, totaling 21 hours.

# Travel:

### Fees:

#### **Pre-requisites/Restrictions**

Maximum of 18 students in this course.

- Introduction to the Desert Fathers
  - Begin with a review of the history leading up to the desert fathers. Also, learn about key themes in their writing and their influence.
- The first Desert Father: St. Paul of Thebes
  - We will learn about the first desert father St. Paul of Thebes and examine the events that lead him to the desert and his life in the desert.
- The Father of Monks: St. Anthony the Great
  - Overview of the life of St. Anthony the Great and readings from St. Athanasius <u>St.</u>
     Antony of the Desert.
- Desert Mothers: St. Syncletica of Alexandria and St. Mary of Egypt

 The desert mothers are the female ascetics who lived in the desert. We will learn about their contributions and consider the lives of St. Syncletica and St. Mary of Egypt.

# • Sayings of the Desert Fathers

 After learning about the lives of several desert fathers and mothers, we will now look at the collection of writings from <u>The Desert Fathers</u>: <u>Sayings of the Early</u> <u>Christian Monks</u>.

# • Influence on monasticism

 The Benedictine, Franciscan, and Hesychast traditions are some of the most popular monastic traditions in Christianity. We will look at how the desert fathers influenced their founders and how it influenced their rules of life.

# • The desert call today

• What does it mean to go into the desert today? What does this mean for our own lives? These questions will be addressed as we conclude the course.



# Stage Combat and Shakespeare

# **Description:**

Wow! That looked so real! How did they do that? In our Stage Combat J-Term you will learn a wide variety of physical techniques to create simulated violence on stage. We will then apply these techniques to several scenes from Shakespeare that include physical violence. These scenes will be pulled from Shakespeare plays such as Macbeth, Hamlet, Taming of the Shrew, Comedy of Errors, and a Midsummer Nights dream.

# Fiber Arts: Weaving and Macramé

### **Description:**

When reflecting on persistence and patience in handcrafting, Hesiod stated, "If you add a little to a little, and do this often, soon that little will become great" (Works and Days, line 361, c. 700 B.C.). This course is designed to introduce the student to great thinkers who have spoken on art and beauty, to develop a fully orbed understanding of humanity's unique ability to reflect on and contribute to what is beautiful, and to view and discuss various fiber art pieces to inspire and engage both the novice and the more knowledgeable.

Hands on instruction is designed to equip students with essential skills in weaving and macramé. In the first half of the course, we'll learn how to set up a loom, select materials, and create stunning woven art pieces finished for wall hanging. The second half of the course focuses on macramé, where we'll master essential knots and patterns to create decorative items like hangers and wall art. The course emphasizes hands-on immersion and innovation.

Throughout the week you'll benefit from personalized feedback and collaborative discussion of projects, fostering a vibrant artistic community in the classroom. By the end of this intensive course, students will leave with their own loom, handcrafted items, and the confidence to continue their fiber art journey. Join this course to unlock your creativity and passion for textile crafting!
